A A A	Serious violent threats or thoughts Family/perpetrator expresses homicidal or aggressive thoughts, urges, plans, or behavior "Serious" includes such things as threats of injury or death and threats with weapons, persistent and intrusive aggressive thoughts, and explicit plans, coded as "Y" Less serious threats, ideation, or intent coded as "P"					
2.	Violent acts Someone within the family/perpetrator has committed actual or attempted physical assault, including sexual assault and use of weapons towards the victim(s) or others "Serious" includes such things as life threatening violence and violence resulting in injuries that require medical attention, coded as "Y" Less serious violence coded as "P"					
3. A A A	Honor related violent acts Someone within the family or perpetrator has previously committed honor related violence 'Honor related' refers to violence that is motivated and justified by perpetrator's honor beliefs and attitudes Includes forced marriages					
4. A A A	Arranged marriages or engagements Family/perpetrator has arranged a marriage or engagement for the victim(s) A victim who is not subject to any known arranged marriage or engagement but has the opinion that he/she is not permitted to freely chose his/her own partner is coded "P" If families/perpetrators previously have arranged marriages for others than the victim(s), which have resulted in forced marriage(s), this should be considered under Item 3 "Honor related violent acts"					
5. A A	Escalation Physical/sexual violence or threats/ideation/intent (including control) have increased in frequency or severity over time Included is escalation of psychological pressure towards the victim(s)					
6. ^	Attitudes that support honor violence Family/perpetrator expresses sub-cultural or personal beliefs and values that encourage, excuse, justify, or minimize abusive, controlling, and violent behavior (e.g. forced marriages) Includes norms of virginity					
7. > >	High degree of insult Family/perpetrator experience a high degree of insult (e.g. occurrences in connection to female sexuality/puberty) Less serious experienced insults coded as "P"					
8. >	Origin from an area with known sub-cultural values supporting honor violence, forced marriages or genital mutilation Family/perpetrator has an origin from an area with known sub-cultures values supporting honor related violence, forced marriages or genital mutilation					
9. A A	Lack of cultural integration Family/perpetrator has a low degree (and/or willingness) of cultural integration in country Segregated living					
10.	Psychosocial problems Family/perpetrator experience employment and/or financial problems Mental health problems Substance use problems					
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Victim Vulnerability Factors ¹	
 11. Inconsistent behavior and/or attitude toward family/perpetrator Contacts family/perpetrator directly or indirectly Sends "mixed messages" Minimizes or denies family/perpetrator's actions Places blame on self Feels family/perpetrator's actions are partially justified 	
 12. Extreme fear of family/perpetrator Victim's level of fear interferes with self-protective behavior Terrified, panicked, traumatized Victim lacks the ability to follow a safety plan if confronted with family/perpetrator Afraid to terminate relationship with family/perpetrator Extremely worried for dependents (e.g. children, parents, new partner, pets) 	
 13. Inadequate access to resources Victim lacks the knowledge, ability, or motivation to access protective resources Unaware of laws, legal rights, organizations Poor social skills Reluctant to use resources Little contact with friends and acquaintances High degree of control from family/perpetrator and/or a sub cultural/religious environment 	
 14. Unsafe living situation Inadequate physical security at work or home Insecure transportation Emergency service not readily available Mandatory contact with family/perpetrator (e.g. young age, shared custody of children) 	
 15. Personal problems that might influence management strategies Victim's personal problems interferes with self-protective behavior Employment or financial problems Legal problems Mental problems Substance use problems
